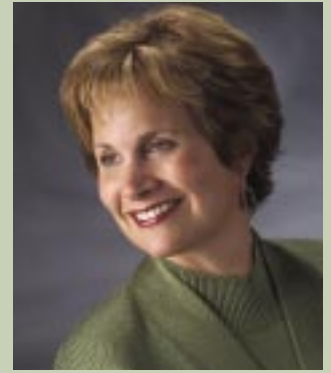

Dear Friends,

It is my pleasure to be able to report to you about the activities of the Lackawanna Heritage Valley Authority in 2007. It was a year of transition and expansion. In September, following the sale of our Mayfield building, LHVA moved to beautiful offices on the fifth floor of the Scranton Life Building in the heart of downtown Scranton. It is great to enjoy the revitalized surroundings in the urban hub of the Lackawanna Heritage Valley!

LHVA has evolved to a new stage of development, and the staff has expanded as well. Foremost, Dan Perry became Chief Operating Officer and Colleen Carter is now Director of Programs. Stephanie Milewski, who is also a registered landscape architect, joined LHVA in November as manager of Trails and Environmental Programs. Filling this slot is essential to the development of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail (LRHT), and Stephanie is organizing innovative environmental and conservation projects. Jack Carling, the dean of contracts management, continues to guide LHVA with the benefit of his valuable experience dealing with governmental entities. Sarah Piccini, who earned her degree (summa cum laude!) in December from the University of Scranton, also graduated from LHVA intern to Program Officer/Interpretive Specialist. Alice Sokoloski, our skilled Fiscal Director, along with Beverlyann Liuzzo and Diane Chelik, provide grants management and meticulous record keeping. The entire team is passionate about the mission of LHVA.



LHVA is now one of twelve State Heritage Areas in Pennsylvania. The number of National Heritage Areas has grown from fifteen to thirty-seven as of December 2007. This is a mixed blessing. While more citizens are becoming aware of the importance of heritage areas to their respective communities, funding levels have remained the same or, in many instances, decreased. Therefore, LHVA faces increasing challenges in sustaining its operations and programs. LHVA always has fostered and supported partnerships. As it moves forward with more of its own programs, the opportunity to fund other entities is diminishing. Nonetheless, we are optimistic that the creation of a new not-for-profit entity that is being established with the endorsement of the LHVA Board of Directors and the new Majority County Commissioners, will allow us opportunities to apply for new funding sources in the private sector.

As LHVA matures, there is a greater sense of urgency to accomplish the goals of its Management Plan. The most pressing objective is to complete the forty-mile Lackawanna River Heritage Trail (LRHT). Rather than building the trail in small pieces with its own funds, LHVA is reaching out to legislators, local officials and municipalities to join in securing new funds. This approach will facilitate trail development and, in addition to enhancing the quality of life, it will offer opportunities for historic interpretation, recreation, environmental art, and health and wellness activities.

Trails are popular and powerful catalysts for economic development. They also require numerous technical studies and lots of money to design and build. LHVA is fortunate that each of our legislators, at both the Federal and State levels, is a strong advocate of the LRHT. With their help, there will be significant progress to report by this time next year.

This report offers a glimpse of the activities and accomplishments of the past year. This year, a new volunteer organization will be formed for hands-on help from our friends. Please let us know if you would like to join us as we move forward to conserve, preserve and foster appreciation for the great resources of the Lackawanna Heritage Valley.

Mission

The Lackawanna Heritage Valley Authority (LHVA) is a partnership of government, business, civic organizations, and individuals dedicated to the development of the region's historic, cultural, economic, and natural resources through preservation, education, and promotion of our heritage.

LHVA's Goals

1. Tell the region's story.
2. Facilitate partnerships.
3. Preserve and enhance the physical character and economic vitality of the communities in the Lackawanna Valley.
4. Improve the visitor experience.
5. Reconnect people to the Lackawanna River.

National Heritage Areas

The Lackawanna Heritage Valley is one of the nation's thirty-seven National Heritage Areas, regions recognized by the United States Congress for their unique contributions to the American experience. In partnership with the National Park Service, LHVA celebrates the nationally significant history of the Lackawanna Valley, preserving it for the benefit of current and future generations.

Pennsylvania Heritage Areas Program

Administered by the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, the Pennsylvania Heritage Areas Program is guided by five goals: economic development, partnerships, cultural conservation, recreation and open space, and education and interpretation. The initiative provides a catalyst for diverse groups within a region to develop a unified strategy for protecting, preserving, developing, and promoting the region's heritage. Pennsylvania has twelve heritage areas, and the Lackawanna Heritage Valley was designated the first Pennsylvania heritage area in April 1991.

Environmental Conservation and the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail

LHVA is committed to regional environmental efforts through a variety of educational programs, trail development projects, and events.

Lackawanna River Heritage Trail

As 2008 begins, LHVA is launching an exciting new phase of development for the Heritage Trail along the Lackawanna River. Completion of the Trail is the signature project of LHVA. Therefore, a renewed commitment and more aggressive approach have been adopted to develop the trail in its entirety rather than mile by mile. When completed, the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail (LRHT) will allow walkers, runners, and cyclists to enjoy forty miles of recreational opportunities along the river from Forest City to the confluence of the Lackawanna and Susquehanna Rivers at Duryea.

New Trail Section Opened

In September, LHVA and the Lackawanna County Commissioners cut the ribbon on the newest section of the LRHT in Carbondale Township and Mayfield Borough. Just over a mile long, the beautiful trail follows the west bank of the Lackawanna River through a wooded, park-like setting. Sections of the LRHT in the Mid-Valley and in Scranton's South Side have been in active use for several years. These trails attract hundreds of regular users, and the newest section is already popular.

Downtown Riverfront Heritage Greenway

The Greenway is in the final design stage and it is anticipated that construction will begin in the summer of 2008. A spur trail to Scranton High School, providing a safe alternative route to Scranton neighborhoods as well as to Central City, will ameliorate a treacherous traffic situation at the end of the school day. The Master Plan for the Greenway has been the catalyst for a Riverfront District Master Plan that will extend to the proposed Commonwealth Medical College as well as to the Scranton Laceworks and ArtSpace projects along the levee at Albright Avenue.

Funding Support is Key for Trail Development

Funding for the Trail has been provided by the PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, the PA Department of Transportation, and the National Park Service. Senator Robert Mellow, as well as the Scranton Area Foundation, recognizing the economic impact of the trail projects, have granted critical funding for the Greenway and Master Plan. LHVA continues to explore new funding opportunities. With community support and collaboration, every mile of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail will be at some level of development by 2009!

Environmental Outreach

- The South Scranton CNJ Railroad section of the LRHT was targeted for a public cleanup in July. WNEP-TV gave the event extensive coverage. PA American Water Company and PennDOT District #4-0 donated water, gloves, and garbage bags.
- "Community Connections to the Watershed" is a successful annual environmental education program coordinated by community partners including LHVA. Teams of high school students and teachers learned about the Lackawanna River watershed using monthly field trips, classroom activities, and final projects.
- The "Tuesday Nature Series" and "Stormwater Seminars;" hosted by Lackawanna College's Environmental Institute and LHVA, raised the public's awareness about environmental issues in 2007. LHVA will continue to collaborate with LCEI on environmental programs in 2008.

Community and Economic Development

Tourism is a powerful economic generator in the Lackawanna region. LHVA supports efforts to strengthen communities and to help market the region as a destination.

Heritage Explorer Train

In August, the LHVA Heritage Explorer Train took nearly 300 adults and children on a fun-filled excursion to Carbondale's "Pioneer Day" festival aboard one of Steamtown National Historic Site's historic diesel trains. During the ride, each family received a "goody bag" and enjoyed entertainment, then joined the lively celebration in Carbondale. This inaugural project was made possible by an alliance of generous and committed partners.

Santa Train

Communities from Carbondale to Dickson City come together every year to welcome Santa Claus as he rides into their towns on a special train, courtesy of Steamtown National Historic Site. LHVA is proud to support this unique program, now in its tenth year.

Directional Rack Card Project

LHVA, the Lackawanna County Convention and Visitors Bureau, and its cultural and historic site partners developed directional cards to aid visitors as they travel around the Lackawanna Valley. The free cards include directions, mileage counter, map, and site contact information.

Heritage Explorer Trolley Stops Program

Lackawanna County and LHVA developed the Heritage Explorer Trolley Stops program for summer 2007 to provide a free shuttle bus to Scranton's many cultural and historic sites. The ride included an audio narration with fun facts about the area.

Cultural Conservation, Historic Preservation, and Local Heritage

LHVA celebrates cultural traditions in Northeastern Pennsylvania, encourages the preservation of ethnic and traditional folkways, and promotes historic preservation efforts.

Catlin House Restoration

The Lackawanna Historical Society embarked on a meticulous restoration of the Catlin House, the hundred-year-old Tudor style house in Scranton that serves as the Society's headquarters and museum, with support from LHVA.

Ethnic Groups Featured in New Films

WVIA, the region's public television station, developed two original documentaries with major support from LHVA.

- **"Ubaldo"** is about "La Festa Dei Ceri," an 800-year-old cultural festival that is celebrated in only two places in the world – Gubbio, Italy, and Jessup, PA. Known locally as the Race of the Saints, the Jessup festival is an important expression of Italian cultural heritage.
- **"The Extraordinary Journey"** is a poignant three-part mini-series about the immigration of over 100,000 eastern Europeans from 26 different homelands and their settlement in Northeastern Pennsylvania between 1880 and 1930.

"The Wall That Heals"

For Veterans' Day weekend 2007, the Everhart Museum hosted "The Wall That Heals," a half-scale replica of the Vietnam Veterans' Memorial in Washington, D.C., on the twenty-fifth anniversary of the dedication of the VVM. More than 14,000 people visited the Wall while it was in Scranton.

"The Last Thoughts of Gino Merli"

Scranton Public Theatre developed this powerful play about the WWII Medal of Honor recipient from Peckville. More than 10,000 students saw the play on its tour through area school districts.

Interpretation and Place-Based Education

LHVA supports programs that tell the story of the region's heritage and culture, and it encourages stewardship of its environmental resources.

Interpretive Displays

- **Electric City Trolley Restoration Shop** developed a new display at its Montage Mountain location to tell the history of trolleys in the area.
- **The Lackawanna Coal Mine Tour** opened a new Interpretive Center that includes an orientation film, an expanded gift shop, and a modern ticketing area.

Children's Centers

- **Steamtown National Historic Site** turned an unused space into a vibrant, colorful new "Imagination Station" that is a hub for new children's programming.
- **The Electric City Trolley Museum** enhanced its children's exhibit with interactive stations, kid-friendly furniture, and a book of special trolley-themed activities.

Summer Heritage Passport Program

LHVA partners with the Lackawanna County Library System on this popular annual children's program that highlights local heritage with performing and visual artists, LHVA's Traveling Trunks, and a children's passport for free admission to local attractions.

Classical Pieces Bring Local Heritage to Life

In May, the Northeastern Pennsylvania Philharmonic premiered "Reverie," a newly commissioned classical piece based on the region's heritage. In October, the "Tune into Heritage" Family Concert included an hour of hands-on, kid-friendly activities by cultural and heritage sites.

Partnerships

LHVA builds strong partnerships to develop important projects that have a measurable impact on Northeastern Pennsylvania.

Public Involvement

LHVA coordinates several ongoing forums.

- **The Heritage Valley Roundtable** brings together, on a monthly basis, the directors of local sites and key community organizations to network and develop collaborative projects.
- **The Conservation Alliance** is a partnership of more than thirty environmental groups who share resources and ideas to further conservation in the region.
- **The Education Advisory Council** gathers educators and community representatives to help LHVA produce new, innovative educational projects.

Heritage Ambassadors' Program

This popular program takes visitors on a full day's tour of local sites and attractions to highlight LHVA's many partners and projects, to promote the region's heritage and environmental renewal, and to celebrate the high quality of life enjoyed by local residents. LHVA has hosted over 500 ambassadors since 2001.

French Delegation Visits LHVA

The Alliance of National Heritage Areas and the Fédération de Parcs Naturels Régionaux, a system of forty-five regional nature parks in France, have entered into a memorandum of understanding to promote mutual understanding across international boundaries. LHVA is one of the lead National Heritage Areas in this initiative, and was honored to host the delegation during their visit to Pennsylvania.

Funding Partners

The Lackawanna Heritage Valley Authority receives funding from a variety of federal, state, and local partners. The **National Park Service** (NPS) is the federal agency responsible for preserving nationally significant natural and historic resources for present and future generations. Through the National Heritage Areas program, NPS helps preserve and protect the historic and cultural landscapes that define our American experience. NPS funds support LHVA's administrative and project activities.

The **Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources** (DCNR) assists LHVA with funding for administration and implementation through Pennsylvania Heritage Areas Program. LHVA also receives DCNR funding through the Community Conservation Partnerships Program and through special initiatives by key Pennsylvania legislators. As an important partner for the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail, the **Pennsylvania Department of Transportation** has granted significant state and federal monies to LHVA for design and construction of Trail sections.

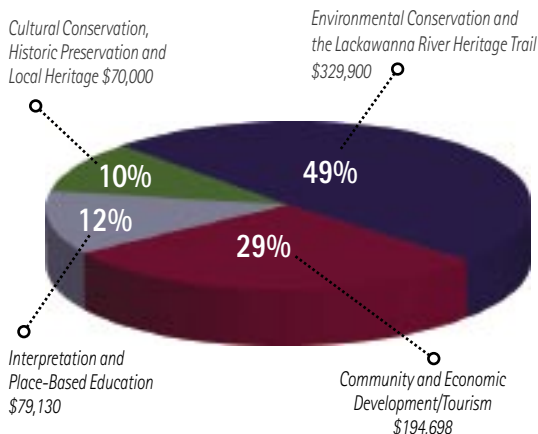
LHVA also has received funding and/or programmatic support from **Lackawanna County**, the **Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development's Office of Tourism**, **First Liberty Bank and Trust**, and **Old Forge Bank**.

Fiscal Year 2007

The Lackawanna Heritage Valley Authority awards funding to organizations for projects that are aligned with one or more of LHVA's funding goals. These goals are based on LHVA's "Plan for the Lackawanna Heritage Valley" (1991), its "Management Action Plan and Environmental Impact Study" (2004), its Core Commitments, and the goals of its funding agencies.

LHVA awarded \$673,728 in grant funding to 66 new projects and programs in 2007. The total project cost for these initiatives was \$3,342,288. LHVA's grant funding is an investment in Northeastern Pennsylvania that stimulates the region's economic development, enhances tourism initiatives, strengthens the capacity of community organizations, and increases the quality of life for area residents.
