Welcome to the Lackawanna Heritage Valley

The Lackawanna Heritage Valley made some big moves in 2012, highlighted by the acquisition and relocation to a new building in Scranton.



The new home of LHV is ideally located near downtown Scranton, next to the 7th Avenue trailhead and overlooking the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail and the Lackawanna River. The building not only accommodates administrative staff and operations, with ample parking for visitors, but it also provides room to host public meetings, storage space for trail cleanup tools and equipment, and a great launching pad for volunteer activities. We are happy to offer our partners the use of the building for meetings and events as well.

The cover of this Community Update highlights the unique exhibit that LHV unveiled in October, 2012, at the Scranton/Wilkes-Barre International Airport. This whimsical display showcases the diverse array of historic, cultural, and recreational things to do and see in the Lackawanna Heritage Valley. Located in the baggage retrieval area, this eye-catching montage of images welcomes visitors to the region, and it also serves as a reminder to residents that there are wonderful sites and activities available right under their noses!

A large screen slide show runs continuously in the center of the display. Two interactive digital kiosks in

front of the exhibit provide information about eleven major partners, and a simple touch of the screen will take the user to the website of the attraction about which they are curious. This innovative exhibit, along with a companion brochure, are effective tools to promote tourism and economic development for the region.

I am pleased to report that, despite tighter budgets and diminished funding at every level of government-- federal, state and local-- the Lackawanna Heritage Valley has accomplished a great deal in 2012. The Lackawanna River Heritage Trail continues to expand, with five more miles currently under construction, and trail related spending contributing \$5.4 million to the local economy. Our wonderful volunteer group, Ambassadors in Action, is becoming increasingly involved in supporting our mission. I hope that this update will inspire you to become a Heritage Partner and to help assure that LHV continues its important work.

Funding Partners

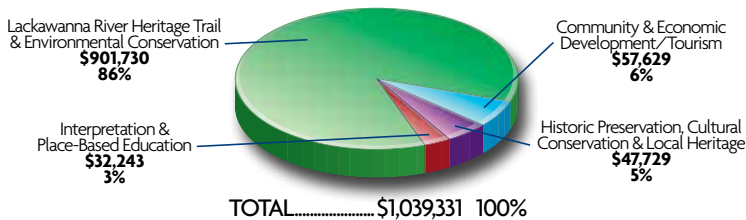
In 2012, the Lackawanna Heritage Valley National and State Heritage Area (LHV) received funding from the National Park Service, as well as from the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources through the Pennsylvania Heritage Areas Program, the TreeVitalize Metro Program, and the Pocono Forest and Waters Conservation Landscape Initiative. The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation provided funding for the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail through the federal Transportation Enhancements Program. Additionally, LHV received generous support through the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program, the Lackawanna County Commissioners as part of the Commonwealth's Growing Greener Bond Fund, Keystone College, the Lackawanna County Department of Arts and Culture, municipalities along the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail, and private sponsors.

Project Support

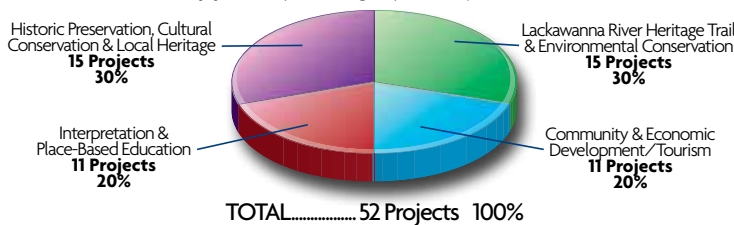
LHV funds projects that fulfill its mission and goals as outlined in the "Plan for the Lackawanna Heritage Valley" (1991), the "LHV Management Plan Update" (2001), and the "Management Action Plan and Environmental Impact Study" (2004). These projects stimulate the region's economic development, enhance tourism initiatives, strengthen the capacity of community organizations, and increase the quality of life for area residents. In 2012:

- LHV provided \$1,039,331 in total funding support for 52 new and ongoing initiatives. Of this:
 - LHV awarded \$103,808 through 42 grants to partner organizations.
 - LHV allocated \$935,523 to support 10 internal projects. Of this, \$884,166 funded the planning, development, improvement, and maintenance of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail.
- The total cost for all 52 projects, including the matching funds raised by partners, was \$1,428,630.
- \$108,782 in goods and services were donated by local businesses to make these projects a reality.

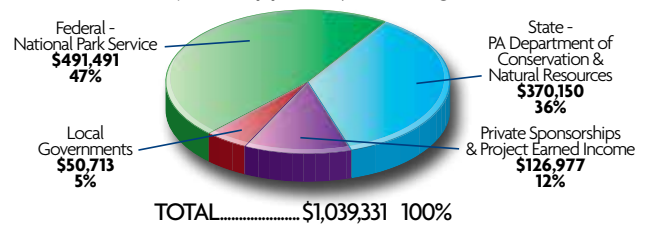

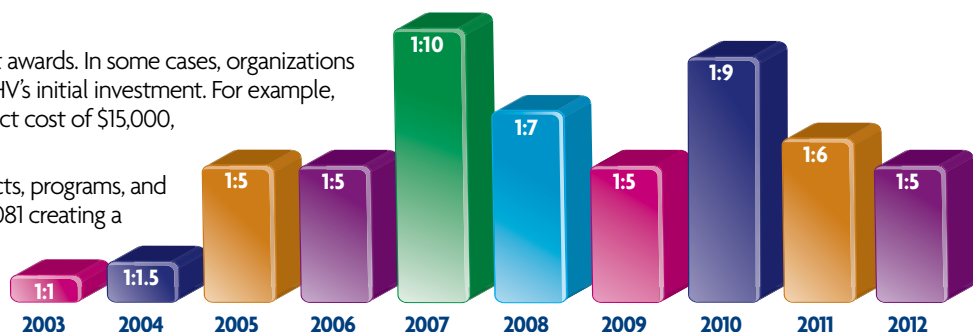
2012 Project Support by Funding Source



Economic Benefits of LHV's Investment

LHV requires a dollar-for-dollar (1:1) match for all of its grant awards. In some cases, organizations bring additional matching funds to a project, building on LHV's initial investment. For example, when LHV awards \$5,000 to a project that has a total project cost of \$15,000, the leverage ratio is 1:3.

In 2012, LHV granted \$103,808 to partners to support projects, programs, and events. The total cost for these partner projects was \$498,081 creating a leveraging ratio of nearly 1:5. This means that for every \$1 that LHV granted for a community project, the partner organization provided almost \$5 in additional funding.

About the Lackawanna Heritage Valley National and State Heritage Area

The Lackawanna Heritage Valley National and State Heritage Area (LHV) is a partnership of government, business, civic organizations, and individuals dedicated to the development of the region's historic, cultural, economic, and natural resources through preservation, education, and promotion of our heritage. LHV is managed by the Lackawanna Heritage Valley Authority (LHVA), a municipal authority of Lackawanna County. In 2009, Heritage Valley Partners, Inc. was created as the nonprofit support entity to diversify funding and to attract additional public awareness to the mission and programs of the Lackawanna Heritage Valley. The goals of the Lackawanna Heritage Valley are to:

1. Tell the region's story.
2. Facilitate partnerships.
3. Preserve and enhance the physical character and economic vitality of the communities in the Lackawanna Valley.
4. Improve the visitor experience.
5. Reconnect people and communities to the Lackawanna River.

National Heritage Areas

The Lackawanna Heritage Valley is one of forty-nine National Heritage Areas recognized by Congress for their important contributions to the American experience. In partnership with the National Park Service, LHV celebrates the nationally significant history of the Lackawanna Valley, preserving it for the benefit of current and future generations.

Pennsylvania Heritage Areas Program

The Lackawanna Heritage Valley was designated as Pennsylvania's first heritage area in April 1991. Administered by the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, the Pennsylvania Heritage Areas Program provides a catalyst for diverse groups within a region to protect, preserve, develop, and promote its heritage and natural resources. There are twelve heritage areas in the Commonwealth.

The New Home of the Lackawanna Heritage Valley National & State Heritage Area

In June, the Lackawanna Heritage Valley National and State Heritage Area (LHV) purchased a building and relocated its headquarters to 213 South 7th Avenue in Scranton. Immediately adjacent to the 7th Avenue trailhead of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail (LRHT), the modern building has a large parking lot and houses offices for staff. It also has a large multi-purpose area that can accommodate public meetings and volunteer events, as well as storage space for trail equipment, facilitating the launch of trail clean-ups and other trail activities.



The Lackawanna River Heritage Trail

“THE TRAIL” (Lackawanna River Heritage Trail or LRHT), is a perfect “avenue” to follow for exploration of the Lackawanna Heritage Valley. It is part of a 70+ mile multi-purpose trail system from the New York State border to the City of Pittston in Luzerne County that is suitable for walking, running and biking as well as convenient access for fishing, canoeing and kayaking. The D&H section of trail, which begins in Simpson, lies mostly in Susquehanna

County, and allows equestrian and snowmobile use.

The LRHT connects more than 30 communities. It is important for health and wellness, recreation, alternative transportation, and simple enjoyment of the beautiful natural resources along the Lackawanna River. It also is a powerful engine for economic development. In 2012, LHV committed more than \$5.4 million in trail construction related activities to the local economy.

Building the Trail

In 2012, ground was broken for two new sections of the LRHT. In May, construction started on a two mile segment of trail from Elm Street in Scranton to Depot Street in Taylor. It will be the first trail in the region that has a dual pathway - a 10 foot wide paved path adjacent to a 6 foot wide packed stone dust path. The paved portion of the trail is suitable for bicyclists, families with strollers, and wheelchair users, while the stone dust pathway offers a comfortable surface for walkers, runners, and dog walkers. The Scranton to Taylor trail section is a key element in the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail system. It will complete an eight mile contiguous pedestrian and bicycle path from Market Street in Scranton to Taylor. The Elm Street trailhead is conveniently located within a short walking distance from

the South Side Shopping Center on South Washington Avenue and several neighborhoods in South Scranton. The Department of Conservation & Natural Resources (DCNR), National Park Service (NPS), the Lackawanna County Commissioners and the Pennsylvania Local Share Account funded this important connection. To the north, construction is progressing on an additional three miles of trail that will connect Archbald and Jermyn, improving the streetscape along Laurel, Church and Gilmartin Streets and creating an additional dual surface trail along the former Ontario & Western rail line to Delaware Street in Jermyn. The Archbald to Jermyn component will complete an eight mile trail section linking eight municipalities in the Mid-Valley. This section is a critical connection between the on-street portion of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail in Jermyn to the rail-trail section from Archbald to Blakely, also known as the Mid-Valley Trail.

This section has been funded by the NPS, DCNR, the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation, the Appalachian Regional Commission, the National Scenic Byways Program, the Pennsylvania Community Transportation Initiative and the Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program.

Acquisition & Design of the Trail

Research, property negotiations, extensive technical studies and governmental approvals are often necessary prior to funding and construction of trail sections. In 2012, after years of complicated searches of railroad deeds and ownership titles, LHV acquired three important trail properties, including three abandoned railroad bridges in Fell Township. Redecking and rehabilitation of these bridges is underway to complete a gap between the Carbondale section and the D&H trails. In 2012, LHV also acquired 2.3 additional miles of property that will close three gaps in the trail.

Enjoying the Trail

Each new mile of trail offers more opportunities for individual walkers, runners and bicyclists, as well as high school teams and other organized groups such as the Steamtown Marathon, Tour de Scranton, and the Electric City Runners of the Scranton Running Company, to utilize the trail for practices and competitions. In order to make the trail more usable and enjoyable, and to further its mission to tell the region's story, LHV is completing a comprehensive program that not only will provide safety and directional signage, but that also will interpret important historic, cultural and industrial history along the trail. The signage program will include a Trail User's Guidebook. In the meantime, cue sheets are available to guide users and individual maps will be produced to familiarize residents and visitors with trail alignment and the location of trailheads.



Airport Exhibit

The Environment and Natural Resources



The Lackawanna Heritage Valley abounds with outdoor recreational activities. The scenic Lackawanna River is both the spine of the Valley as well as an incredible natural resource. Once polluted by domestic and industrial waste, the river today is home to bald eagles, river otters, and a host of other aquatic creatures. A significant section of the river has been classified as a Class A trout habitat by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and the river was a finalist for Pennsylvania's 2012 River of the Year.

Our History

Ongoing efforts to preserve and interpret the region's significant historical assets during 2012 involved numerous partnerships and projects. Initiatives ranged from partnering with the Century Club in the restoration of their National Register-listed property in Scranton to supporting the continuing work on the Boston & Maine locomotive with the Steamtown National Historic Site and the Lackawanna & Wyoming Valley Railway Historical

Society. LHV's popular Heritage Explorer and Santa Trains made their annual journeys along the historic D&H railway to the delight and education of hundreds of passengers. Much attention was focused on preservation and planning at the Historic Scranton Iron Furnaces, including plans to create an ambitious public/private partnership and financial and technical support for the third annual Arts on Fire festival. In an effort to help tell the region's mining story, LHV partnered with Leadership Lackawanna in the restoration of the Gravity Slope Colliery's Oil House in Archbald. Also during 2012, an exciting project to save the historic Waverly School House, the earliest school building remaining in Lackawanna County, was launched.



Culture

Promoting the region's ethnic heritage and diversity always has been central to LHV's mission. During 2012, LHV fostered a number of programs that highlighted the region's exciting and varied cultures including the annual La Festa Italiana, the Carbondale Ethnic Festival, and programs and performances highlighting Ukrainian, Lithuanian, and Jewish heritage, among others.

We need your help! If you enjoy history, care about the environment, and want to make a difference in your community, become an "Ambassador in Action," a member of LHV's enthusiastic and growing volunteer corps! Ambassadors participate in trail clean-ups, assist with the popular Santa Train, organize



the annual Bike Tour and are actively engaged in many more fun activities. In 2012, LHV Ambassadors contributed 10,515 hours in 84 different projects and events!

Education

LHV's successful mini-grant program is aimed at supporting projects and programs that involve school children from pre-school through high school. This year's projects include anti-litter awareness, an oral history project, instruction on creating bio diesel from grease,



building trail benches, development of a "peace" garden, learning about water quality and aquatic inhabitants of the Lackawanna River, and creation of clay "river creatures."
