About the Lackawanna Heritage Valley National and State Heritage Area

The Lackawanna Heritage Valley National and State Heritage Area (LHV) is a federal, state, local, and public/private partnership. LHV is managed by the Lackawanna Heritage Valley Authority (LHVA), a municipal authority of Lackawanna County. In 2009, Heritage Valley Partners, Inc, was created as the nonprofit support entity to diversify funding and to attract additional public awareness to the mission and programs of the Lackawanna Heritage Valley. The mission of the Lackawanna Heritage Valley is to facilitate community action in the preservation, promotion and development of the region's history, cultural heritage, and natural resources. In 2014 LHV conducted an economic impact study which found that the Heritage Area contributes \$31.3 million to the local economy.



Economic Investment

LHV requires a dollar-for-dollar (1:1) match for all of its grant awards. In some cases, organizations bring additional matching funds to a project, building on LHV's initial investment. For example, when LHV awards \$5,000 to a project that has a total project cost of \$15,000, the leverage ratio is 1:3.

In 2014, LHV granted \$15,700 to local partners to support projects, programs, and events. The total cost for these partner projects was \$129,949.39 creating a leveraging



Project Support

LHV provides funding for projects that fulfill its mission and goals as outlined in the "Plan for the Lackawanna Heritage Valley" (1991), the "LHV Management Plan Update" (2001), and the "Management Action Plan and Environmental Impact Study" (2004). These projects stimulate the region's economic development, enhance tourism initiatives, strengthen the capacity of community organizations, and increase the quality of life for area residents.

In 2014: LHV provided \$685,247 in total funding support for 25 new and ongoing initiatives.

Of this: LHV awarded \$15,700 through 13 grants to partner organizations.


LHV allocated \$669,547 to support 12 internal projects. Of this, \$615,485 funded the planning, development, improvement, and maintenance of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail. The total cost for all 25 projects, including the matching funds raised by partners, was \$815,196.

Design of the Carbondale Riverwalk

The Carbondale Riverwalk, a 2-mile section of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail (LRHT), will run through the heart of Carbondale's downtown, utilizing streets and railroad corridors to connect commerce with nature and to fuel the city's renaissance. As the next project for the LRHT, the former rail line will be transformed into trail for providing recreational, fitness and social opportunities.

"Confluence" Sculpture Park

Thanks to a unique community partnership and talented industrial artists, large iron sculptures have been installed at several sites along the trail, complementing and enhancing the landscape. The project, "Confluence: Art on the Trail," is a collaborative effort among Keystone College, Keystone Iron Works, the Lackawanna County Department of Arts and Culture and the Lackawanna Heritage Valley. The project is aptly named for the confluence of the Lackawanna and Susquehanna Rivers, as well as the coming together of arts, culture, diverse organizations and the environment. This endeavor was made possible by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts.

LHV Hosts New Exhibitions

LHV transformed the space at its headquarters and hosted two new exhibits in 2014. "An Architecture of Urban Revitalization" featured the final of Marywood University's projects graduating Bachelors of Architecture students, who examined urban conditions and illustrated that architecture can help build community, economy and opportunities. "Written in the Czech Landscape" featured landscape impressions from students and faculty, of Penn State University of Landscape Architecture, including Professor Cecilia Jaswa Rusnak, who specializes in the study of historic landscapes and planning for heritage sites. LHV is looking forward to several exciting exhibits in 2015.

Educational Mini Grant Supports "River of Growth" Project

Students at Neil Armstrong Elementary
School in North Scranton participated
in a project that introduced them to
water conservation and environmental
preservation through hands-on learning
experiences. With funds from an
Educational Mini Grant, Ryan Hnat, the
school's art teacher, spearheaded the
"River of Growth" project. Members of
the PTA volunteered their time to build
flower boxes in the school's courtyard with
a zig zag design that mimics the flow of a river.

Where America's Story Lives

Nay Aug Avenue Nature Park

LHV is building a natural and nature-themed play area along the Lackawanna River in lower Green Ridge, Scranton. The project was initiated by a \$150,000 grant from American Water Charitable Foundation, the nonprofit arm of the American Water Company. Other funders were Lackawanna County, DCNR, Margaret Briggs Foundation and Fidelity Bank. This unique project will create a place for children to have fun while learning about nature, the Lackawanna River create awareness that water is a critical resource. This pocket park along the LRHT will offer a delightful setting for residents of all ages to relax, play and enjoy nature!

"Trails to Prosperity" Conference

On June 4, 2014, LHV hosted dynamic speakers from Tennessee and Minnesota at the "Trails to Prosperity Conference" at the new Best Western Hotel & Conference Center in Carbondale. The theme of the conference was the impact of trails and greenways on economic development. Developers recognize that communities with trails are more livable and enhance property values, not only to homeowners, but also for businesses. Former Chattanooga, Tennessee, Mayor Ron Littlefield and Jason Gaikowski, Director of Brand Design & Marketing, Quality Bicycle Products, related their successes in attracting businesses and the economic impact of trails. LHV also hosts quarterly NEPA Trails Forums that provide regional trail supporters organizations and networking venue where they can share opportunities, challenges and solutions in an informal setting.

University of Scranton Marketing Collaboration

This spring, the University

Scranton marketing students were charged with designing and executing qualitative and quantitative studies for real clients. Thanks to an existing collaboration between the University and the Lackawanna Heritage Valley (LHV), students of Dr. Kim Daniloski's, PhD, conducted research projects related to three live study subjects: Scranton's Iron Furnaces, the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail, and Scranton's Half Marathon. The students provided valuable information to LHV.
