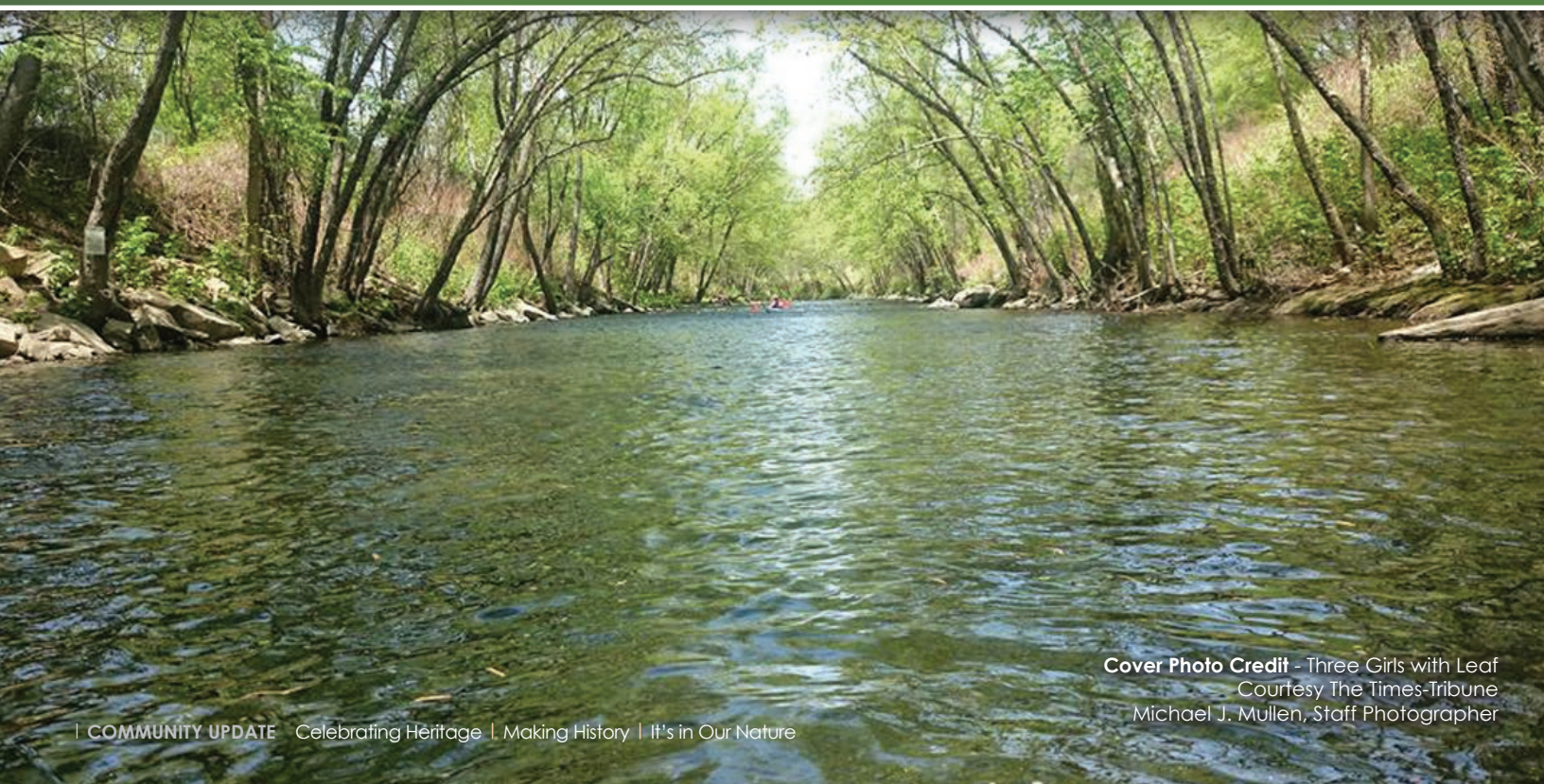

The Path to Progress: Development & Projects Along the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail

In 2016, the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail served as the venue for 30 charitable races, welcoming 13,000 participants to run and walk along its pathways. The trail has become a popular site for charitable events and educational programming. Multiple projects to improve the experience for trail users were initiated this year.

Two major projects on the Scranton Riverwalk were completed with funding from the Scranton Half Marathon Committee.

The Half Marathon Committee donated \$90,000 to fund the installation of fourteen state-of-the-art cameras between the Olive Street and 7th Avenue Trailheads in Scranton with the Scranton Police Department.

The cameras feed live images to Scranton Police Headquarters where the data is monitored 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The Half Marathon also contributed \$58,000 to fund safety improvements on a quarter-mile pathway connecting the

trail on Olive Street to Providence Road, directly across from Scranton High School. This area, known as the "Spur Trail," is now a wonderful space for community programs and events, and for future development of a sculpture park.



With support from hundreds of community volunteers, LHV hosted eight clean-ups in 2016 to help maintain and beautify the trail. Students from Marywood University were among those who shared their time with LHV, participating in a clean-up along the Scranton Riverwalk.

Lackawanna River Heritage Trail By the Numbers

The results of the **2016 Trail User Study and Economic Impact Analysis** indicate that the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail (LRHT) has a significant positive effect on the local economy and on the quality of life for those who live and work in the Lackawanna Heritage Valley.

In 2016:

- The trail generated a total economic impact of **\$90.9 million** for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- The direct economic impact of the LRHT is **\$64.3 million** — an increase from \$31.8 million in 2009. The indirect economic impact is **\$19.4 million** for Lackawanna County and **\$26.6 million** for the state.
- There were approximately **313,200 visits** to the trail — an increase since the 128,000 estimate in 2009.
- The most popular uses for the trail are:
 - 1) Walking/Hiking
 - 2) Running
 - 3) Bicycling

Highlights of additional trail projects

PAVING

To improve the trail's usability for people pushing strollers or utilizing wheelchairs, a 1-mile stretch of trail from the 7th Avenue Trailhead to Elm Street in Scranton was paved in 2016. The project also included improvements to the parking area at this trailhead and a new connection to LHV Headquarters for bicyclists and pedestrians. The project was funded through the Pennsylvania Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program (RACP).

TRAILS SYMPOSIUM

LHV hosted the Annual Trails Symposium at its headquarters in Scranton. The day-long conference featured a panel of state officials, and it welcomed 75 guests for updates on trail development and recreational projects.

OLD FORGE LAND DONATION

The Mariotti family donated 35 acres of land in Old Forge to Lackawanna Heritage Valley. Development of this land, which parallels the Lackawanna River, provides an important link to fill the gap in the trail system between Taylor and Pittston.

MID VALLEY PAVILION

With funding support from Lackawanna County, LHV constructed a pavilion next to a bocce court built by Santarelli & Sons along the Main Avenue trail section in Peckville.

CARBONDALE RIVERWALK

Construction began in September on a 1.2 mile section of trail in Carbondale that will connect to a 2.2 mile section in Fell Township that will link the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail to the D&H Rail-Trail. The Carbondale Riverwalk is scheduled to open in 2017.

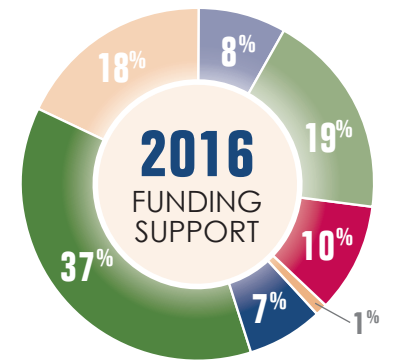

Project Support

Lackawanna Heritage Valley (LHV) funds projects that fulfill its mission and goals. These projects stimulate the region's economic development, enhance tourism initiatives, strengthen the capacity of community organizations and increase the quality of life for area residents. In 2016, Lackawanna Heritage Valley expended \$1,127,840 in total funding for new and ongoing initiatives. Of this, LHV awarded \$18,327 through 17 grants to partner organizations.

LHV allocated \$1,109,514 to support Heritage Area projects. Of this, \$1,083,626 funded the planning, development, improvement and maintenance of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail. The total cost for all projects, including matching funds by partners, was \$1,503,437.

Lackawanna Heritage Valley requires a dollar-for-dollar (1:1) match for all of its grant awards. In 2016, LHV granted \$18,327 to support projects, programs and events. The total cost of 2016 partner projects was \$375,597, creating a leveraging ratio of 1:20.

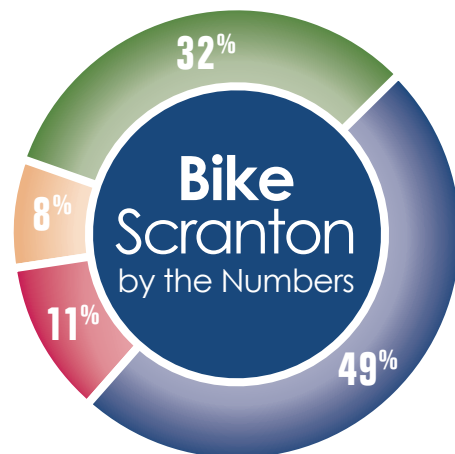
