HISTORY AND HERITAGE AT THE FOREFRONT OF AMBASSADOR TOURS LED BY LACKAWANNA HERITAGE VALLEY AND PARTNER ORGANIZATIONS

Lackawanna Heritage Valley worked alongside a number of community partners to lead a series of local history and heritage ambassador tours throughout 2019.

Lackawanna Heritage Valley was proud to work closely with Leadership Lackawanna throughout 2019, leading three ambassador tours for their "Tomorrow's Leaders Today" high school leadership group and their Core Leadership group for local professionals. LHV was also fortunate to work with Riverside West Elementary School on an all-day "LHV Experience" that taught first-grade students about local history, heritage and natural resources.

In March and November, young student leaders representing high schools throughout Lackawanna County were invited to Lackawanna Heritage Valley to learn about the history and heritage that sets our region apart. After a presentation, the students hit the road to visit significant historic and cultural sites firsthand. Representatives from the Electric City Trolley Museum, Steamtown National Historic Site, Lackawanna Historical Society, the Scranton Cultural Center and the Everhart Museum of

Natural Science, Art and History welcomed the students with informative and fun tours of their respective sites of significance.

Leadership Lackawanna's Core Leadership group of locallyemployed leaders was led on a similar tour of our region's historic and cultural sites. Aside from the sites the high school students attended, the 32 local professional also got to visit the Lackawanna County Coal Mine Tour for an interactive first-hand experience.

In similar fashion, Lackawanna Heritage Valley worked alongside Shannon Malamud, the Riverside School District, and our regional partners dedicated to local history, heritage and natural resources to deliver the "LHV Experience.' Approximately 120 students from six Riverside West Elementary School first-grade classrooms embarked on an all-day learning expo designed to provide a fun, hands-on approach to learning about the history, heritage and natural resources of the region they call home – the Lackawanna Heritage Valley.

From the time students arrived at the Steamtown National Historic Site, they were immersed in the stories of our industrious past. After watching a video on the history of Steamtown, the first-graders experienced the steam engine first hand with a short train excursion. The eager young scholars then visited the Electric City Trolley Museum and heard from the Lackawanna Historical Society and Albright Memorial Library while standing among and within the historic trolleys.

After a short jaunt, walking along the trains back to the Steamtown National Historic Site, students heard from the Lackawanna Heritage Valley National and State Heritage Area, the Lackawanna River Corridor Association and the Anthracite Heritage Museum.

This fun and social learning environment has been a part of Ms. Malamud's first-grade curriculum for several years and is made possible through a partnership grant by Lackawanna Heritage Valley.


THE HERITAGE EXPLORER TRAIN CELEBRATES LOCAL HISTORY IN GRAND, OLD-FASHIONED STYLE

The 2019 Heritage Explorer Train Excursion brought passengers from Steamtown National Historic Site, in Scranton, to Carbondale's Pioneer Days Festival in grand, old-fashioned style, featuring entertainment and lessons in our historic past along the way.

While passengers rode the rails to Carbondale's annual heritage celebration, they were immersed in a local history game show hosted by the Lackawanna Historical Society before being treated to live, period-appropriate music from Doug Smith and the Dixieland All-Stars. Families on board also learned of the rich history of our coal patch towns, our industrious past, and our proud beginnings on the rails and in the mines from Dominic Keating and National Park Ranger Timothy O'Malley, Steamtown National Historic Site.

Representatives from Pioneer Days greeted passengers on the historic train platform before leading them to programs across our region's first city.

This program is sponsored by Lackawanna Heritage Valley, the City of Carbondale, the Greater Carbondale Chamber of Commerce, Lackawanna County Library System, the Greater Carbondale YMCA, Lackawanna County Office of Arts and Culture, Lackawanna Historical Society, and Steamtown National Historic Site.















On a chilly Saturday morning, the Santa Train arrived at five local and historic train stations to greet hundreds of families before transcending to Steamtown National Historic Site's turntable, in Scranton, for a larger event that has become a time-honored family tradition.

The Santa Train is a unique Northeastern Pennsylvania Christmas celebration that brings Santa to each community along the historic D&H railroad line. The train also brings musicians, entertainers and U.S. Marines to each station. This year, more than 2,500 local residents came out to see Santa and to join in the holiday festivities in each community, with more than 3,000 at the final stop at Steamtown National Historic Site. The event is made extra special by teaching children the magic of helping those in need. U.S. Marines collected Toys for Tots at each stop along the trip to give back to local children.

Over the years, the Santa Train has become a beloved part of the holidays in NEPA. Rolling since 1996, this event is a unique opportunity to embrace the holiday spirit while enjoying the rich history surrounding our local rail system.











FALL FAMILY FUN DAY ALONG THE LACKAWANNA RIVER HERITAGE TRAIL



As leaves began to change and the air grew a little colder, Lackawanna Heritage Valley invited families to join us for our Fall Family Fun Day along the Scranton Riverwalk section of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail.

On November 3, 2019, families gathered around the Scranton Half Marathon Pavilion waiting for a very special ride. The click-clack of hooves signaled the time has come as they boarded the hay-filled carriage powered by two beautiful horses from Brookvalley Farms in Carbondale.

Live music could be heard as the passengers neared the Scranton Riverwalk spur, courtesy of Pat Quinn and the Trailblazers. The first thing guests saw as they approached the autumn event -- a goat meet-and-greet.

There was plenty of fun to be had at this free community event. Families gathered around the campfire to roast marshmallows and craft s'mores made with the irresistible Gertrude Hawk chocolate bars. Warming up by the fire also meant some hot chocolate sipping was in order.

LACKAWANNA RIVER HERITAGE TRAIL



New Trail Section Underway in Dickson City

Lackawanna Heritage Valley has continued to work on the design of the Dickson City section of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail throughout 2019. Construction for this new section of trail will begin in the spring of 2020. The proposed section will measure approximately one mile and will link Railroad Street to Lackawanna Avenue. Part of the trail will pass under the railroad trestle from Olyphant to Dickson City. This project will link existing sections of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail and, once the corridor has been completed, it will allow residents and visitors to travel continuously along the trail route in a more convenient and safe manner.



Carbondale Riverwalk Links with New Spur

The Carbondale Riverwalk opened in the spring of 2018, but part of the original project needed to be cut due to budget constraints. In 2019, LHVA was able to complete a new, 1/2 mile spur section that takes trail users along the east side of the Lackawanna River to Holt Lumber and Belmont Street. This additional spur, though short in distance, will link existing communities and businesses, like Gentex, back to the serene Lackawanna River andis designed to be fully accessible for wheelchairs and strollers. The construction of the riverwalk and subsequent spur was made possible by the generosity of our partners, DCNR, PennDOT, DCED and local municipalities.

Scranton Corridor Projects Aim to Create Safe Connections Between Neighborhoods, Downtown

Lackawanna Heritage Valley is currently working towards the creation of two safer passageways within the City of Scranton that aim to connect city neighborhoods with Downtown businesses and assist in safer pedestrian travel in this areas. The 1-mile Marvine section of trail should begin construction in the spring of 2020. The trail section will offer a safer corridor for people along the Lackawanna River through the old Marvine Colliery lands in the northern part of the City. LHVA will also begin construction on a connector along Railroad Avenue, which will pass under Bridge 60 and continue along the adjacent U-HAUL property toward Lackawanna Avenue within the city.



VOLUNTEERING ALONG THE HERITAGE TRAIL

From cleaning up debris along the trail to leading enthusiastic runners along the course of the Scranton Half Marathon, more than 1,000 dedicated volunteers helped to fuel LHV efforts and make our communities a cleaner, safer and more enjoyable place in 2019.

This year, volunteers helped with the planning and execution of several special events, new and returning programs, and maintaining and enhancing the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail. Volunteers clocked in nearly 7,500 hours throughout 40 volunteering events and on their own time.

CELEBRATING OUR RESOURCES ALONG THE TRAIL AND IN NATURE

The 2019 calendar of events and programs along the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail brought a rich assortment of community connections and fun and educational programs that brought preserving and enriching our resources to the forefront of the conversation.



THE HERITAGE EXPLORER BIKE TOUR MAKES ITS RETURN ALONG OUR REGION'S NEWEST RECREATIONAL ASSET

After a short hiatus, Lackawanna Heritage Valley's Heritage Explorer Bike Tour made its return in the fall of 2019, highlighting the newest section of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail, from Carbondale through Fell Township.

The Heritage Explorer Bike Tour had been a local favorite for years, serving as an opportunity to both celebrate and promote the development of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail. Its return to the calendar was made extra special as it proudly brought our communities together to celebrate the region's newest recreational asset.

Cyclists embarked on a 20-mile stretch of the newly-debuted scenic path linking the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail to the D&H Rail-Trail. The fun, family-friendly and noncompetitive event offered riders of all ages and abilities the opportunity to ride along the Heritage Trail from Carbondale, through Vandling, Forest City, and past the Stillwater Dam in Union Dale, going as far as Ararat Township in

Susquehanna County. Riders had the choice to choose between the 3-mile, 12-mile, 22-mile, or 40-mile round trip rides.

The event, which took place on September 29, 2019, began and ended at the John Street Trailhead in Carbondale, the site of the Greater Carbondale YMCA's newly constructed Community Park. Riders received event t-shirts, information packets and sponsored giveaways before enjoying a complimentary breakfast, choosing their route length and hitting the new trail.

Upon returning to the park grounds, participants enjoyed a catered lunch before trying their luck at raffle baskets, playing in the park, and checking out the YMCA's autumn community festival. From kids on tricycles to longer distance cyclists, hundreds of people enjoyed the returning tradition.

Lackawanna Heritage Valley and the Rail-Trail Council of NEPA organized a ribbon-cutting ceremony and car tour on July 31 to celebrate a newly restored trail section now open to residents and visitors of the region. The redeveloped section consists of a 10-mile trail corridor from Simpson in Lackawanna County, along the edge of Wayne County, and into Union Dale in Susquehanna County. The Rail-Trail Council of NEPA and LHVA worked on the corridor together and now the trail is a continuous 20 miles from Carbondale to Ararat Township in Susquehanna County.

JANE FRYE LEADS THE COMMUNITY IN SERIES OF INFO-PACKED NATURE WALKS

Amateur naturalist Jane Frye led a series of three Guided Nature Walks throughout the summer along the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail. The walks focused on lessons in edible wild plants, identifying wildflowers, and the types of native plants and flowers you can expect to see locally. This program series helped to promote environmental awareness, health and fitness along the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail.





FAMILIES VOLUNTEER AT THE NAY AUG AVENUE NATURAL PLAY AREA

Dozens of families spanning all ages and backgrounds rallied together at the Nay Aug Avenue Natural Play Area for a day of family volunteering on Wednesday, July 31. With a common belief that time spent volunteering together strengthens families and builds healthy, thriving communities, dozens of regional families cleaned playground equipment, planted trees and shrubbery, pulled weeds, added mulch, and spruced up the very popular natural playground in Scranton.
