A Year in the Life of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail

The Lackawanna River Heritage Trail (LRHT) flourished in 2015 with projects to improve the experience for trail users. Plenty of activities were held throughout the year. Highlights include:

Heritage Explorer Bike Tour & Festival:

In June, hundreds of bicyclists of all ages participated in the annual bike tour and festival at the Blakely Borough Recreation Complex. This family-friendly event featured four outand-back routes along the trail, followed by a festival promoting health, wellness and outdoor recreation. In the fall, the bike tour won the Hometown Hero SAGE Award, presented by the Greater Scranton Chamber of Commerce.

Nay Aug Avenue Natural Play Area: The Heritage Valley celebrated the opening of Pennsylvania's first natural play area in July. The Nay Aug Avenue Natural Play Area is a new trailhead park located in the Green Ridge section of Scranton, adjacent to the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail and the levee of the Lackawanna River.

Mid Valley Section Paving Project: To help maintain optimal conditions for trail users in the Mid Valley, the section between Blakely and Archbald was paved in the fall. The new surface allows more people to enjoy this beautiful section of trail, including those using wheelchairs. It also enhances the experience for parents pushing strollers, and children riding tricycles or bikes with training wheels. In addition, the paved surface can be plowed following snow, allowing the trail to stay open year-round.

Miles of Trail.

New Fishing Pier in Archbald: Lackawanna Heritage Valley (LHV) partnered with Aylesworth Creek Reservoir Park Authority to build the Nick Staback Veterans Fishing Pier at Archbald Borough Gravity Slope Recreation Park. The new fishing pier, which opened in November, is located near the Laurel Street Trailhead, at the southern end of Laurel Street in Archbald. Adjacent to the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail, the pier is ADA compliant, providing greater access and increased opportunities for fishing in this stretch of the Lackawanna River.

Interpretive Signs: Designed to share the story of the region's land, people and industry, the first group in a series of interpretive signs along the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail was installed along sections of trail between Archbald and Jermyn in the fall. The new signs aid in navigation of the trail system while providing information about the region's heritage.

S'mores Party on the Trail: In October, families enjoyed a special day along the CNJ Extension of the Trail in Taylor. The event featured music by Pat Quinn and the Heritage Trailblazers, Spooky Stories with Taylor Community Library, Pumpkin Painting, a Scarecrow-Making Party, and s'mores by the campfire. More than 200 children participated in the festivities.

Thousands of Charitable Steps Forward.

In addition to serving as a popular venue for running, walking and bicycling groups, the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail is utilized by dozens of non-profit and charitable organizations to host fundraising races and walks.



In 2015, 8,858 males runners, bicyclists, and walkers participated in charitable events along the trail.



Economic Investment

Lackawanna Heritage Valley requires a dollar-for-dollar (1:1) match for all of its grant awards. Organizations bring additional matching funds to a project, building on LHV's initial investment. For example, when LHV awards \$5,000 to a project that has a total project cost of \$15,000, the leverage ratio is 1:3.

In 2015, LHV granted \$17,420 to local organizations to support projects, programs and events. The total cost of 2015 partner projects was \$295,562 creating a leveraging ratio of 1:17.



Project Support

Lackawanna Heritage Valley funds projects that fulfill its mission and goals as outlined in the *Plan for the Lackawanna Heritage Valley* (1991), the *LHV Management Plan Update* (2001), and the *Management Action Plan and Environmental Impact Study* (2004). These projects stimulate the region's economic development, enhance tourism initiatives, strengthen the capacity of community organizations and increase the quality of life for area residents.

In 2015, Lackawanna Heritage Valley expended \$1,508,842 in total funding for 35 new and ongoing initiatives. Of this, LHV awarded \$17,420 through 24 grants to partner organizations.

LHV allocated \$1,487,925 to support 11 Heritage Area projects. Of this, \$1,426,563 funded the planning, development, improvement and maintenance of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail. The total cost for all 35 projects, including matching funds raised by partners, was \$1,883,487.

New Projects

Pedal Power

In May 2015, Heritage Valley Partners and Lackawanna Heritage

Valley launched BikeScranton, a free bike share program. BikeScranton was made possible through a \$15,000 grant from Northeastern Pennsylvania Healthcare Foundation.


The program enjoyed immediate success, with bicycles available at four locations: The Weinberg Library at The University of Scranton, Hilton Scranton & Conference Center, Cedar Bike & Paddle and Lackawanna Heritage Valley Headquarters. With a photo ID, adults age 18 and older may borrow a bicycle for a short time, or for an entire day for free! The program is popular with a wide variety of people, from local riders to tourists; from college students to senior citizens.

80% (538) of the bicycles were borrowed from The University of Scranton and the Hilton Scranton & Conference Center

63% (422) of the bicycles shared were used by people under the age of 30

52% (347) of the bikes were borrowed by Scranton residents

Communing With Nature in the Heart of Scranton

The Nay Aug Avenue Natural Play Area in the Green Ridge section of Scranton opened on July 27, 2015. Located on Nay Aug Avenue, between Green Ridge Street and East Market Street, the park is situated on land adjacent to the levee of the Lackawanna River and the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail. The project began with a grant from the American Water Charitable Foundation, which led to generous donations from DCNR and other public and private entities. Designed by McLane Associates, the play area is built with natural and recycled materials. Funders and supporters include: American Water Charitable Foundation, PA Department of Conservation & Natural Resources (PA DCNR), The Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Foundation, Fidelity Deposit & Discount Bank, National Park Service (NPS), Lackawanna County, Willary Foundation, Margaret Briggs Foundation, Christopher & Dana Reeve Foundation, Pennsylvania Environmental Council (PEC), and the City of Scranton.
