22ND ANNUAL SANTA TRAIN **DELIVERS HOLIDAY CHEER TO SIX** LOCAL, HISTORIC TRAIN STATIONS

Lackawanna Heritage Valley conducted our 22nd Annual 'Christmas in a Small Town' Santa Train event on Dec. 1, 2018.

The Santa Train, a unique local holiday tradition, brought Santa to each station along the historic D&H railroad line. Along with Saint

Nick, the Santa Train brought along musicians, entertainers, local celebrities and United States Marines to each station.

TRAIN RIDES DELIVER LESSONS IN HISTORY ALONG LOCAL RAILWAYS

Families enjoyed three train excursions within the Lackawanna Heritage Valley in 2018. The D&H Penn Division Explorer trips emphasized the rich history of the coal patch towns between Scranton and Archbald and the environmental treasures found along the way. While following the Penn Division of the former Delaware and Hudson Railroad Route, remnants of other railroads and our industrial past were in view. Families also took a step back in time with a special Heritage Explorer train excursion, traveling to Carbondale's annual Pioneer Days celebration. Passengers rode in grand, old-fashioned style to this heritage celebration, enjoying a trivia gameshow from the Lackawanna Historical Society, stories from passengers and live music on their journey.

LEADERSHIP LACKAWANNA INTRODUCES 'SCRANTON FOUNDERS' DAY'

Working alongside Lackawanna Heritage Valley, the 2018 class of Leadership Lackawanna hosted an inaugural 'Scranton Founders' Day' celebration honoring the history of the city's people, land and the industry with which the area was built.

The event, held on Saturday, April 28, 2018, helped to foster a sense of community pride and appreciation for the history of Scranton and the surrounding areas.

This free-to-attend event boasted historically relevant games, live music, reenactments, local vendors and a bounce house.

The day was filled with fun and educational family-friendly activities that brought children back in time to the early days of our region - without sacrificing the modern marvel of cotton candy, of course!

ADAPTIVE BIKE SHARE PROGRAM



In our continued effort to ensure the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail is enjoyable and accessible to all, Lackawanna Heritage Valley launched their Adaptive Bike Rideshare Program in the spring of 2018.

This new venture offers hand cycles and recumbent bikes to wheelchair-bound riders and people with mobility impairments, so that they may enjoy the sport of cycling and making use of the trail.

The fleet of adaptive bikes includes two recumbent bicycles, designed for people with balance impairments, and three hand cycles that allow riders to peddle with their arms.

These specialty bikes expensive, but residents

and visitors of Lackawanna County can use the bikes free-of-charge through the new LHV program.

Joe Salva is a resident of Olyphant and was in a work-related accident in 2004 that has challenged his mobility. Since his accident, Salva has dedicated his time serving as president of Individual Abilities in Motion, or I AM, a local organization working to support people with spinal cord injuries and disorders. He was one of the first in the community to put the new adaptive bikes to the test.

"When I first hand cycled, I didn't think I was going to get as much out of it, but the first time I was able to do it, going down the trail and feeling the wind in your face - the sense of freedom. It's definitely a different type of exercise than I would normally get," Salva said.

The adaptive bicycle ride share program has been made possible in part due to a Northeastern Pennsylvania Health Care Foundation grant. The bikes are currently stored at the Lackawanna Heritage Valley's "Going down the trail and feeling main office on Railroad

"It was very heartwarming to see they were as concerned with giving people of all abilities that option to utilize their bike-share program and all of the efforts that go into making that trail accessible for everybody," Salva said.

Confluence Sculpture Park Expansion

Keystone Iron Works and the International Conference on Contemporary Cast Iron Art unveiled nine new sculptures on the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail, which were submitted by artists from around the country. Named for the confluence of the Lackawanna and Susquehanna Rivers, as well as the coming together of arts, culture and the environment, these nine new post-industrial cast-iron sculptures are located on the spur across from Scranton High School and proudly showcase Lackawanna Heritage Valley's rich industrial history.



Scranton Safety Crossings

LHV made major safety improvements at six busy intersections along the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail throughout the summer of 2018. Colorful green crosswalks and improved lighting and signage were put in place to help in keeping trail users safe. The crossings, in place at Elm, Broadway, Olive, Poplar, Albright and Market Streets, were made possible through grants from the Department of Community and Economic Development's multimodal program and Act 13 local share, with local match provided by Lackawanna County, the City of Scranton, the University of Scranton and LHV.

Carbondale Riverwalk Adds 1.4 Mile Stretch of Trail Connecting Carbondale and Simpson

In the spring of 2018, Lackawanna Heritage Valley officially opened the Carbondale Riverwalk, a 1.4-mile stretch of trail that serves as a vital connection between the on-street portions of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail in Carbondale and the D&H Rail-Trail extension in Simpson. It is conveniently located close to downtown Carbondale for residents, the business community, and visitors to the area and is fully accessible for wheelchairs and strollers. The construction of the riverwalk was made possible by the generosity of our partners, DCNR, PennDOT, DCED and local municipalities. VOLUNTEERING ALONC THE HERITAGE TRAIL

From cleaning up debris along the trail to leading enthusiastic runners along the course of the Scranton Half Marathon, more than five hundred dedicated volunteers helped to fuel LHV efforts and make our communities a cleaner, safer and more enjoyable place in 2018.

This year, volunteers helped with the planning and execution of several special events, new and returning programs, and maintaining and enhancing the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail.

Groups including the United States Naval Sea Cadets completed community trail service along the Mid Valley section of trail while students from the University of Scranton spent Earth Day cleaning up the trail from Olive Street through Broadway in Scranton. Lackawanna College and Marywood University also contributed to keeping our trails and communities in beautiful condition.

Dedicated members of the Cigna Health Services family took to the trail several times throughout the year to ensure its upkeep and the Rotary Club of Scranton also pitched in their time and gave back to the community.

The Lackawanna River Conservation Association cleaned out a major section in Olyphant in the fall, while the local Freemasons from Carbondale Lodge No. 249 held a cleanup effort further north in Carbondale. Members of the local carpenters union, Brotherhood of Carpenters # 445, built fencing along the trail.

The Scranton Half Marathon brought 120 volunteers to the trail to plan for and execute one of the region's most celebrated running events and plenty of volunteers and organizations helped lead our free BikeScranton, BikeCarbondale, and Adaptable Bikeshare programs.

Kyle, Brandon, and Brendan of Career Technology Center of Lackawanna County undertook a very unique volunteer project this fall. The three representing CTCLC Welding Lab took on the unique and wellappreciated task of welding the head back on to our previously beheaded turtle sculpture, bringing the art back to life.

Through scavenger hunts, train rides, special events and working outside, dozens more volunteers and partner organizations rallied alongside the LHV team, improving their communities, preserving our natural resources and developing our future.

In 2018, Lackawanna Heritage Valley expended \$1,164,822 in total funding for 35 new and ongoing initiatives. Of this, Lackawanna Heritage Valley awarded \$31,086 through 23 grants to partner organizations and schools.

Lackawanna Heritage Valley allocated \$1,133,736 to support Heritage Area projects. Of this, \$1,094,158 funded the planning, development, improvement and maintenance of the Lackawanna River Heritage Trail.
